
Workplace Sexual Harassment




Workplace sexual harassment is a serious and pervasive problem. One in three workers experience workplace sexual harassment. As well as causing significant personal harm, it costs the economy more than \$3.8 billion a year.

A survey commissioned by Our Watch in September 2024 of 1500 Australians (500 workplace leaders, 1000 employees) found significant differences in how the issue is viewed by leaders and employees, and by men and women.

Since 2023, changes to the law have required employers to take proactive steps to prevent workplace sexual harassment. Were you aware of these changes?
