In the last five years ...

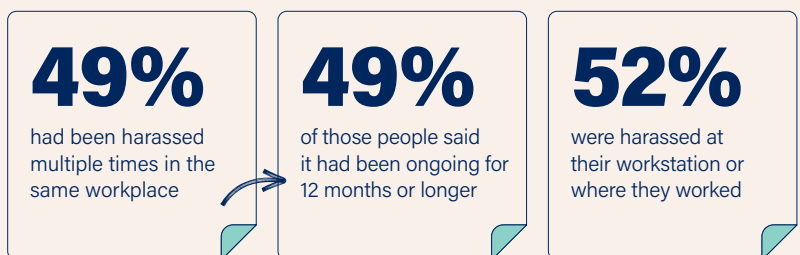
1 in 3 people experienced workplace sexual harassment.

Women (41%) were more likely than **men (26%)** to have experienced workplace sexual harassment.

The most common forms of sexual harassment were:

- sexually suggestive comments or jokes
- Intrusive questions about private life or physical appearance

For employees who experienced sexual harassment in the last five years...



When discussing the most recent incident of sexual harassment, employees said...

- **64%** were harassed by a single harasser
- **79%** indicated one or more of their harassers were male
- where the most recent incident involved a single harasser, **54%** indicated that the harasser was aged 40 or older
- victims said that the harasser was most commonly a co-worker employed at the same level (**27%** for single harassers, and **35%** for multiple harassers).

Sexual harassment has negative impacts on an organisation's:


- productivity
